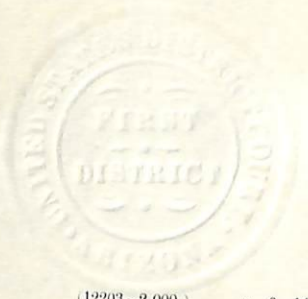



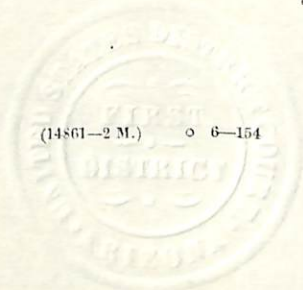

Pocahontas Mine Location Notice

Notice of Location, Notice is hereby given to all whom it may concern that we, Thomas Shearn, W. E. Hensley and J. L. Stiles, the undersigned under the provisions of the act of Congress entitled, "An Act to promote the development of the mining resources of the United States" Approved May 10th 1872, have located this lode mining claim, the same being situated in the Patagonia mining District, County of Pima Territory of Arizona, and bounded and described as follows; Commencing at a monument of stones erected at the westerly end of the claim near the ledge, which monument of stones is near the Village of Washington Camp about three miles from the Snowy Silver mine, southerly, thence southerly 300 feet to a stake in a monument of stones; thence northerly 1500 feet more or less, to a stake in a monument of stones, thence northerly 300 feet to a stake in a monument of stones erected at the center of the Easterly end of the claim, thence northerly 300 feet to a stake in a monument of stones, thence South westerly 1500 feet more or less, to a stake in a monument of stones, and thence southerly 300 feet to the place of beginning. 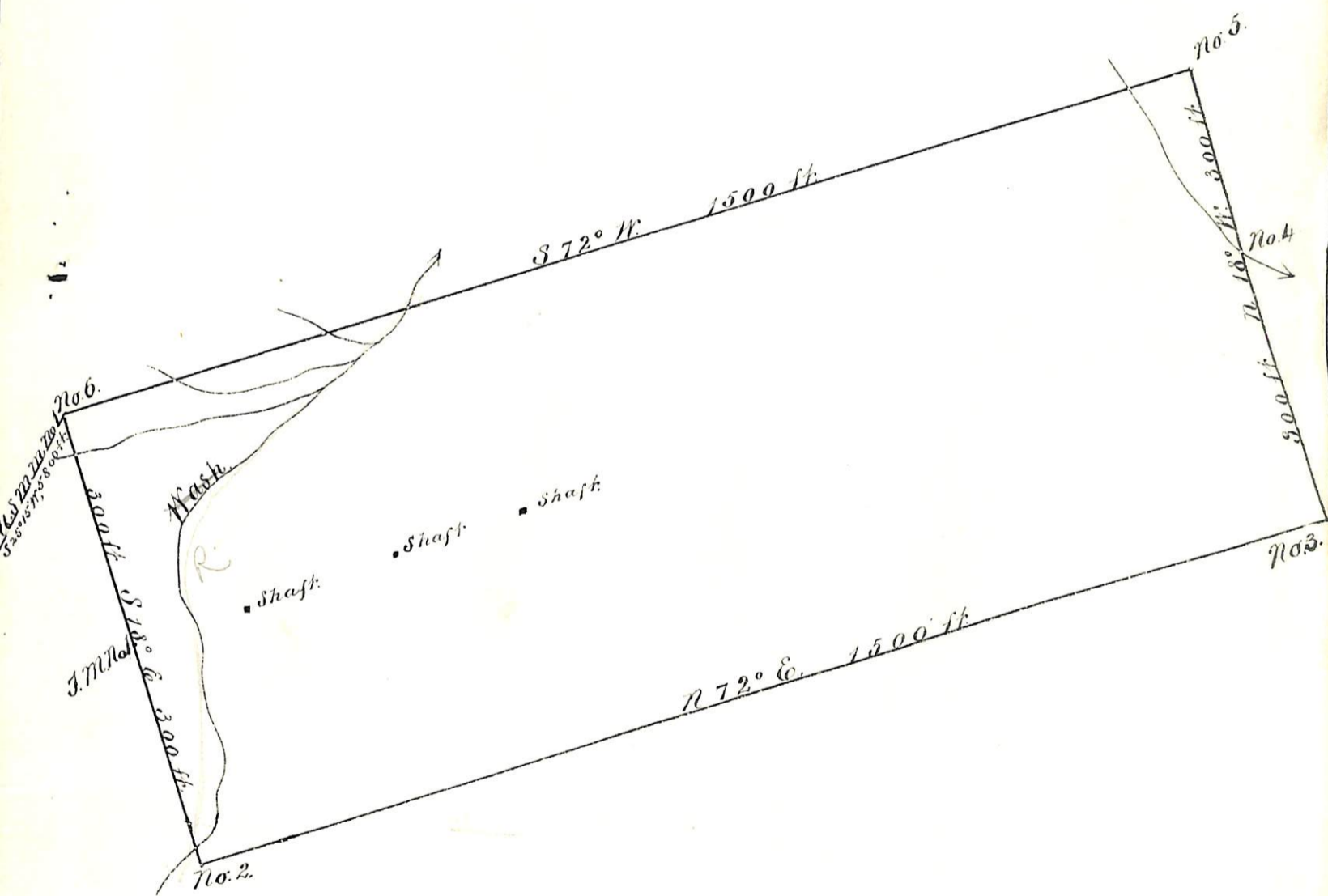
