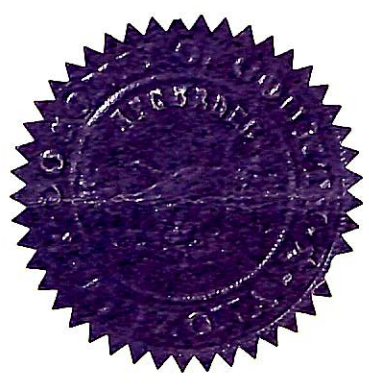

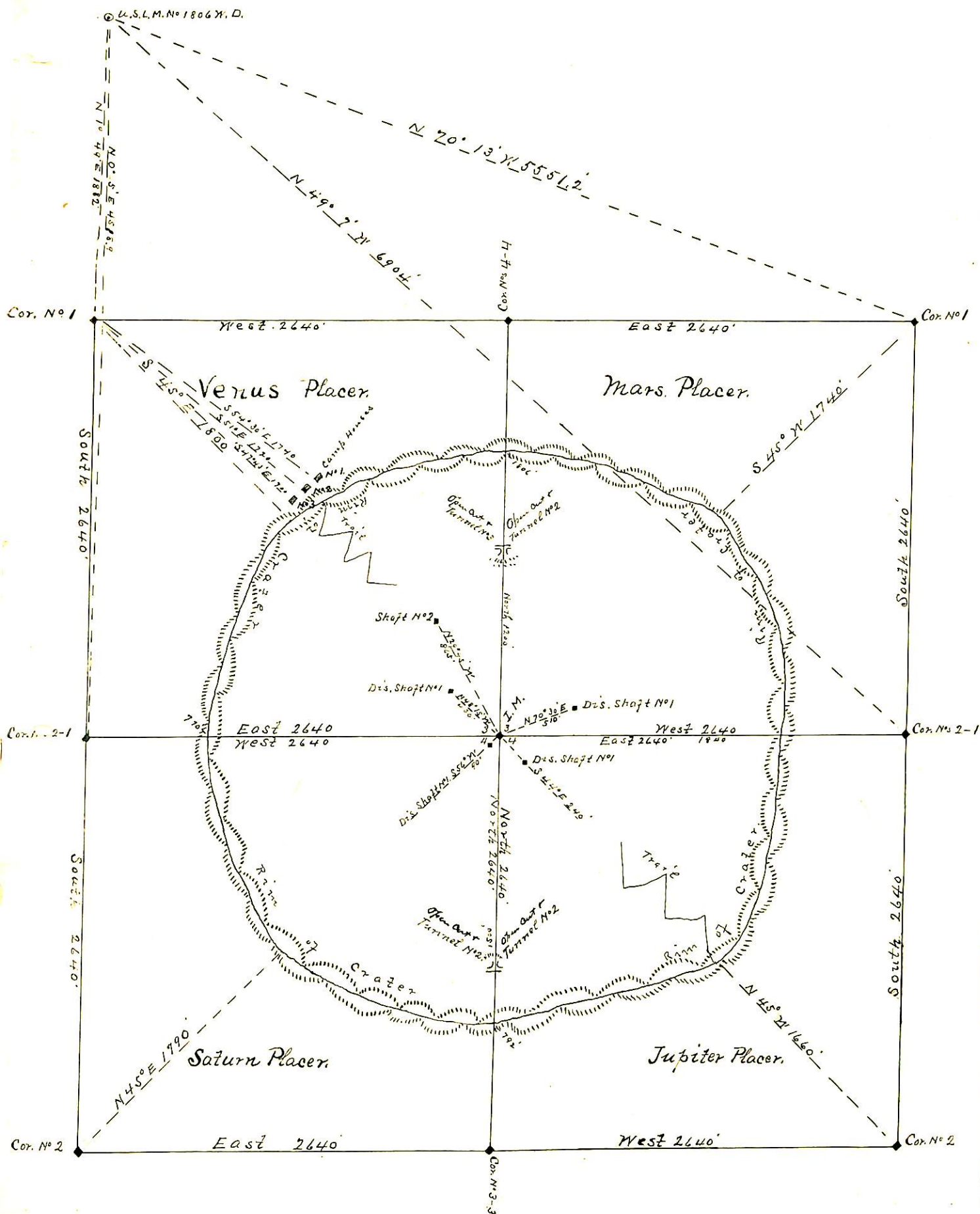

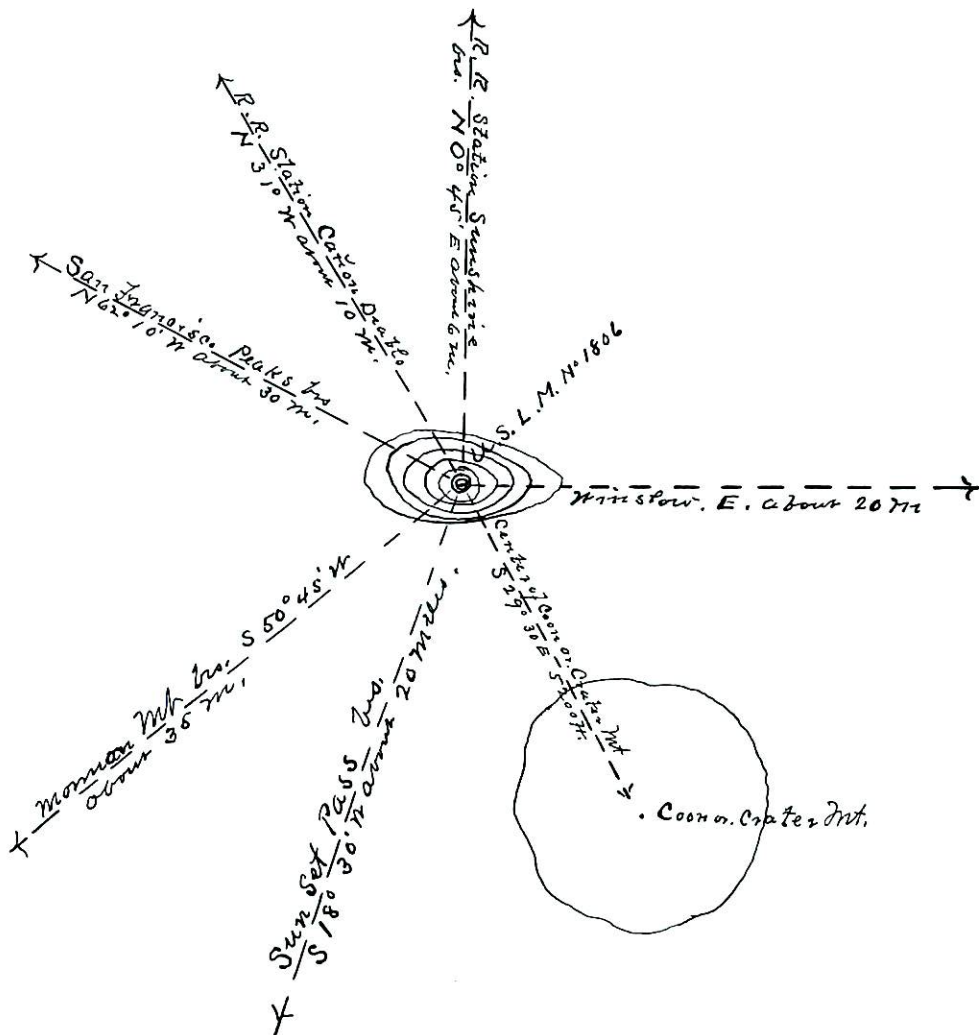
# Survey No 1806 Prescott Land District
