FEET

This survey was made with a Universal Wild T-2 Theodolite No. T2-68064, reading by optical micrometer to one second of arc. The instrument was in good condition at the time of the survey and all adjustments were in good order.

All azimuths in this record were determined by the method of deflection angles referred to the meridian determined by the following observation:

May 9, 1964, at Cor. No. 2, Rusty Rock lode on line 4-1 Survey No. 4602 Gold Star No. 3 lode, in latitude 34°02' North and longitude 112°09'02" West, I made a series of six observations on Polaris, three direct and three reverse, for azimuth turning from a point on line 1-2. The true bearing of line 1-2 was found to be S. 88°38'40" East.

The lines were measured with a Lufkin steel tape 300 feet in length graduated every foot throughout its length except the 1st, 99th, 199th, and 299 feet, which are graduated to tenths and hundredths of a foot. The tape was compared with a standard tape at the time of the survey and found to be correct.

All lines and connections of this survey were run by direct methods.

The magnetic declination observed at each corner of the survey gave a uniform value of 14°40' East.

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

DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. — That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.

Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly, we have suffered the longest continuance of a political connection with Great Britain, than any other people on Earth. But when a long train of abuses, and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a design to reduce us to absolute Tyranny, it is our duty, not only to ignore such Acts, but to throw off such Government, and to institute new Governments, laying their foundation on such principles and organizing their powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness.

In the name of the good People of the Colonies, we solemnly declare, that we are united in a free and independent State, united in Bond and in Covenants, separate from all other Kingdoms, and that we are absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all former Attachments to that King, are hereby disavowed and rejected.

In Testimony whereof, the Representatives of the United Colonies, by their deputies, in General Congress assembled, have caused this Declaration to be signed by their respective Deputies, in the Name and in Behalf of the said Colonies.

Done at Philadelphia, the 4th Day of September, 1776.
