Chains Applicant for listing, Edward McFarlane, Application No. 214 dated June 6, 1912; List No. 3-2552, dated May 26, 1913; Serial No. 024893, made in the Phoenix Land Office on April 25, 1914 by Edward McFarlane.

Also a tract of unlisted land adjoining claimant's entry was included in this survey. The land is agricultural in character, was desired by the entryman, and will be listed as a basis for amendment of his H. E. No. 024893, Application No. 214 dated June 6, 1912.

Surveyed under special instructions from the Surveyor General for Arizona dated October 17, 1914, and designated as Homestead Entry Survey No. 297.

Located in unsurveyed T. 24 S., R. 19 E., G. and S. R. B. and Meridian, in what will probably be when surveyed Secs. 7 and 18, and 8.

Surveyed under Acts of June 11, 1906 and June 30, 1914.

Survey commenced February 18, 1915 and executed with a Buff and Buff Forest Service transit No. 9700-6 with full vertical circle. The horizontal limb is provided with two double verniers, placed opposite to each other and reading to single minutes of arc, which is also the least count on the verniers of the vertical circle.

I test the adjustments of the transit and make necessary corrections.

All distances are horizontal and were reduced from measurements made on the slope with a 500 link steel tape.

The slope angles were determined with a clinometer.

All courses are true and are referred to the meridian established at the cor. to secs. 12 and 13, T. 24 S., R. 19 E., and 7 and 18, T. 24 S., R. 19 E., which was established by me by direct solar observation on

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Description.

This claim comprises both bottom and mesa land. The bottom land is a sandy loam and is well adapted to orcharding and the raising of corn and hay, while the mesa land will grow any of the dry farm products. At the time of survey there was no land under cultivation, but I saw new farm implements upon the ground, which the claimant said he would use this year.

This is not a mineralized section and I saw no indication of mineral on the ground.

1. Inspection was begun May 25, 1917 and completed May 25, 1917. The case is a metes and bounds survey situated in unsurveyed Secs. 7, 8 and 18, T. 24 S., R. 19 E., G. and S. R. B. and M., Coronado National Forest, Arizona.
2. The transit used was a Buff and Buff light Mountain. Bearings of lines referred by angulation to azimuth determined by obsn. of Polaris on May 16, 1917 in connection with the survey of H. E. S. 534.
3. The lands included in the survey are properly listable from viewpoint of status and classification.
4. No overlap or hiatus exist.
5. This claim is situated in an unsurveyed township and the position of the corners do not depend upon the public land survey. The survey is sufficiently simple to include a small tract of arable land along the NW. bdy.
6. The corners were of good material and were well set - Corners and witnesses properly marked.
7. The position of the corners does not depend upon subdivisions and is believed to be correct.

9. No field corrections were necessary.
10. It is recommended that line 1-2 be changed from N. $1^{\circ} 35'$ E.
24.86 to N. $1^{\circ} 35'$ E. 24.85 to agree with the change made
in H. E. S. 296, change accepted by Surveyor. With the
exception of line 5-6 which is a short line the survey
is within the inspection limits as given in Circular of
May 24, 1914, and it is therefore recommended that the
survey be accepted.


