Surveyed under Acts of June 11, 1906 and March 4, 1915, together with special instructions from the Surveyor General for Arizona, dated September 23, 1915, and designated as Homestead Entry Survey No. 404.

Situated in what will probably be, when surveyed, sec. 35, T. 5 N., R. 13 E., Gila and Salt River Base and Meridian, within the Tonto National Forest, Arizona.

Survey commenced March 24, 1916, and executed with a W. -itle and L. E. Gurley light mountain transit No. 12953. provided with prism eye piece, stadia wires, vertical - circle, and Burt solar attachment. The horizontal limb of the transit has two double verniers placed opposite each other and graduated to single minutes of arc, which is also the graduation upon the verniers of the latitude and declination arcs.

> I test the adjustments of the transit and solar attachment and make necessary corrections.

All distances are horizontal, and were reduced from measurements made directly on the slope with a 500 link steel tape graduated to links and tenths. The slope ; angles, were determined with a clinometer, the vernier of which reads to degrees . I and a read break

The mountains to the N. of this claim have been located for asbestos and the mesa to the South for oil, but no townsites, mining, coal or oil claims are known to conflict with this survey.

Kirby post office is 7 miles by wagon road in a Southerly direction, and Globe railway station is 26 miles beyond Kirby in a Southeasterly direction.
