In section 27 is a large spring of fresh water, called Smith's Spring; from which a stream of water flows down a canon and crosses the section line bet. secs. 26 and 27.

The whole township is covered with a heavy growth of pine, fir, spruce, balsam, and aspen timber. Grass grows abundantly in all parts.

Subdivisions T. 23 N. R. 7 E.

In section 23, there is a cienega containing 20 acres, fenced and cultivated by Smith, who has erected a house in the S. W. 1/4 of the sec.

This is the only settler in the township. Near the center of sec. 7 is a large spring of fresh water, improved and claimed by the A-1 cattle company.
