## General Description

This township is mostly rolling  
and level land, covered with palo  
verde, mesquite, catclaw, and  
greasewood undergrowth and  
some cacti. The soil is mostly

gravelly loam. The land along the "Pantano" is of a fine quality, capable of producing an abundance of crops with the necessary irrigation. During the rainy season the "Pantano" carries an abundance of water; otherwise there is no water within the surveyed portion.

There is some good land in this Township within the Camp Lowell Military Reservation which should be surveyed as there are a number of settlers who are anxious to perfect their titles. There are no settlers in the surveyed portion of the Tp.

The Pantano which is called a river, creek or wash, has well defined banks averaging from 4 to 20 ft in height;



the same carries a watershed of not less than 50 miles and has running water in some portions throughout the year, while in others the water sinks and disappears at times coming again on the surface during the rainy season, a characteristic with most of Arizona rivers.
