I, Fred Horn, of lawful age, being duly sworn, upon my oath, depose and say as follows:

My P.O. address is Tucson, Ariz., 8½ miles W. of my ranch situated on ~~Jaggin Creek~~ Jaggin Creek on the West side of the Huachuca Mts. I am personally acquainted with James A. Sutherland and with the land he is claiming on Carr Creek on the West side of the Huachuca Mts. about 4 miles East of my ranch and the improvements thereon have been since the year 1895. During the year 1895 I lived with Sutherland on his place and the next year I live on Haas's place about 3 miles West of Sutherland's place and since 1897 I have lived on my ranch on Jaggin Creek referred to above. During the period 1895 up to the present time to my own personal knowledge said Sutherland has lived on the land he is now claiming and has used it for agricultural and grazing purposes. He has a three or four room adobe house, a good well of water, lumber barn & sheds, corral, chicken house, about 2 to 2½ acres in orchard, a small garden plot, about 2 acres more or less in alfalfa and 160 acres ^{more or less} covered with three barbed wire. From my own personal knowledge and observation I believe that said Sutherland wants the land for a home and for agricultural and grazing purposes and for his own use and benefit. I have no interest in said claim and am not in any way related to said Sutherland.

I, O. J. Hand, of lawful age, being duly sworn, upon my oath, depose and say as follows: My P.O. address is Sycuanne, Ariz. some thirty miles W. of my ranch on Bear Creek on the West side of the Huachuca Mountains.

I am acquainted with James A. Sutherland and have known him ever since he came to southwestern Arizona. When he came out to live on his brother's ranch I am not good at remembering dates best it must be about twenty-five years ago. I am acquainted with the land he is now claiming and which we know as the "Heleps place". I knew the place for about five years while Heleps had it and I know he sold out to Sutherland and Charley Blomberg - Charley joined the Salvation Army and left the ranch and Sutherland had to pay it out and he has made his home from that time to the present time - in all some 17 or 18 years. And before that time he was on his brother's ranch about 9 miles N.E. of his present claim. At the time Heleps had the claim I had a ranch some ^{tent} fifteen miles west from the Heleps place and a short time before or about the time Heleps sold out to Sutherland, I moved to my present ranch on Bear Creek a little south of west and about three miles from Sutherland's place and have lived there up to date. Sutherland has a good adobe house, two or three acres in orchard, good lumber barn & sheds, chicken house; good well of water, small garden, two acres in alfalfa

and 160 acres more or less under orchard
will fence. From my own personal knowledge
I am satisfied that Sutherland brought out
Haskel because of the orchard and the
grazing land and that he has used it for
that purpose up to present time and that
he does not derive to any great extent to
the land on account of any mineral
thereon - I do not know of any
mineral having been discovered thereon
and would say from my knowledge
of the land that is mostly valuable
for the orchard thereon and the
grazing and water it affords. There
is some oak timber thereon, but not
of sufficient size and quantity to be
valuable for anything more than fire
wood & posts for fences.

I have no personal interest in
Sutherland's claim and am in no
way related to said Sutherland.

I, James A. Sutherland of lawful age,
being duly sworn, upon my oath, depose and say
as follows:

My nearest post office address is Marburg, Arizona,
about 5 miles North of my ranch and is in Ramsey
Canon on the East side of the Huachuca Mountains and
only reached from my ranch by a very difficult trail
over the mountains. A part of the time I get my mail
at Lowell, about forty miles from my ranch, especially
in the summer months when I make two trips weekly to
Lowell and Bisbee to sell fruit.

I am the identical James A. Sutherland who
made application for survey of a tract of 160 acres of land
supposed to be in section 4 and 5 of T. 24 S. R. 20 E. on
February 17, 1910. I have been in the quiet peaceful possession
of the land for which survey is asked since February 12, 1894,
when myself and Charles Blomberg acquired the improvement
and claim to 160 acres from one B. J. Herleyp, for
consideration of one hundred and fifty dollars, which
I have paid in full and I have lived on the land in
question ever since at my home ever the date last referred
to come up to the present time. I have been riding on and
other facts miles of my present home ever the year 1885
having lived on my brother's ranch about 4 miles West
of my claim and have been associated with the same & am
still living there since that year. Herleyp at that time had a
cabin by the creek and was running a saw mill further
up the canon. He did not play his orchard or
make the improvements which I acquired until two
or three years later. At the time Myself and Blomberg
bought the claim and improvements - such improvements
were as recited in his deed made to us as follows:

"One (1) two room frame house, situated about seventy-five
yards more or less from Cave Creek on S. side of said
creek; one (1) frame blacksmith shop one (1) frame
chicken house; one (1) post corral; one (1) board
corral; one (1) water trough; one (1) water tank; frame.

Also - one orchard of bearing fruit trees consisting of
Pearl, Plum, Pear, Apricot and Cherry trees - also all
the fence, wire etc, erected and now on said Ranch
place." As soon as Blomberg and I had bought
the Herleyp place I came here to live. I made the
first payment of \$1.00 on the place February 12, 1894, of
which Blomberg paid \$1.00. He stayed on the place about
a week and then joined the Salvation Army and left
the ranch and has never returned to the ranch to live -
and for the \$1.00 which he paid on the claim, he re-
ceived about \$200. from sale of fruit that year. I do,

in question had as to my residence and improvements thereon. (6)
 John Hand, who has a ranch about two miles W. of
 mine can testify as to my improvements and residence
 for the past eighteen years also as to the prior claim
 of Heleip, as the said Hand has lived on his present
 ranch about seventeen or eighteen years and to my
 knowledge has never within 9 or 8 miles of my ranch
 since 1886, as he had another ranch in this part of
 the country before he took up his present one.

For the past eighteen years I have made my
 living on the ranch by raising cattle and selling
 fruit in the summer months - the land is well
 adapted to fruit growing - I have some 200 trees
 bearing - also it furnishes good grazing for stock.
 I have about two acres in alfalfa irrigated by adobe
 from Cane Creek - and about $\frac{1}{2}$ acre in garden.
 Bought the Claim of Heleip because of the orchard
 principally as I could make a living off of it
 alone - as the fruit of a fine quality and brings
 a good price on the Raton and Durall Market.
 Since settling on the land, I have built a good four
 room adobe house, planted inside dug a well installed
 a horse power pump, built larger barns, bought
 sheep my claim built lumber barn and sheds and
 have fifty, fifty to seventy fruit trees. I now have
 about 45 head of cattle, 12 horses two burros, 12 cows
 and pigs and about 70 chickens. I took the place for
 agricultural purposes and the grazing afforded
 for cattle and for a horse. I have also been able
 to cut considerable hay off of the land. My claim is
 situated within the Coors National Forest and there
 is some scrub oak and brush on my land - but
 not of size enough to be useful for anything more
 than firewood and fence posts. There is no mineral
 on the land that I know of, although Frank
 Johnson and Joe McCabe hold a mining claim
 which took probably 200 ft. off of the E. end of my
 claim - they located this claim about seven or eight
 years ago - but have never discovered any ore
 and all the assessment work they have done has been
 on soft ground and consists of seven or eight holes
 dug for each year's assessment work - their claim
 if a valid one would take in my house and well and
 believe they have simply located it so as to take
 my water I did not take the land for mineral
 purposes and do not believe it is of that character -
 but only valuable for agricultural and grazing pur-
 poses and as such I have asked for its return.

I am fifty-eight years of age, a naturalized
 American citizen; have no family - am a widower my
 wife having died more than 20 years ago. No one but
 myself was any present or promised witness on my
 affidavit. (Interlineations made before signature.)

Survey commenced October 22, 1911, and executed with an A. Lietz Co. light mountain transit No 5631 with solar attachment. The horizontal limb is provided with two double verniers placed opposite to each other reading to single minutes of arc, which is also the least count of the verniers of the latitude and declination arcs. The instrument was examined and approved by the Supervising Surveyor

I examine the adjustments of the transit and find them correct; then, to test the solar apparatus, by comparing its indications, resulting from solar observations made during a.m., and p.m. hours with a meridian determined by observations on Polaris, I proceed as follows:

At J. A. Sutherland's ranch; latitude $31^{\circ} 22'$ N. longitude ; I set off $31^{\circ} 22'$ N. on the lat. arc; $10^{\circ} 53\frac{1}{2}'$ S. on the decl. arc; and at 4h. 00m. p.m. l.m.t., determine with the solar a meridian and mark a point thereof, on a stone firmly set in the ground 5 chs. N. of my station.

October 23, 1911.

October 23: At 5h. 23m. a.m., by my watch which has correct l.m.t., I observe Polaris at western elongation in accordance with Manual of instructions, and mark a point in the line thus determined, on a peg driven in the ground 5 chs. N. of my station.

At 7h. 30m. a.m., I lay off the azimuth of Polaris, $1^{\circ} 22'$ to the east, and mark the meridian thus determined by cutting a small groove in the stone set October 23, on which the meridian coincides with the meridian determined by the solar.

At 8h. 00m. a.m., l.m.t., I set off $31^{\circ} 22'$ N. on the latitude arc; $11^{\circ} 08'$ S. on the decl. arc; and mark a point in the meridian determined with the solar, by a cross on the stone already set 5 chs. N. of my station; this mark coincides with the meridian established by the Polaris observation.

The solar apparatus by p.m., and a.m., observations, defines positions for meridians which coincide with the meridian determined by the Polaris observations; therefore I conclude that the adjustments of the instrument are satisfactory.

The magnetic bearing of the true meridian, at 8h. 15m. a.m., is N. $13^{\circ} 30'$ W. the angle thus determined gives the mag. decl. $13^{\circ} 30'$ E.
